## The story of... Sokheang

Sokheang joined AP in August 2016 at the age of 8. Originally from the Provinces, Sokheang moved with her two younger siblings to Phnom Penh in 2016.

At first, the children lived with their grandparents, who were already resident in the capital. However, Sokheang's mother was not pleased with the level of care the grandparents were providing to them and decided to move to Phnom Penh to care for them herself. This resulted in Sokheang's mother moving to the Steung Meanchey dumpsite area where she tries to make a living for her family by collecting plastics.



Today, Sokheang is 10 years old and studying in grade 2. Upon joining AP, she was two years behind her peers and was incapable of reading or writing the Khmer alphabet. Attending AP's extracurricular classes and receiving extra tutoring, Sokheang has been steadily improving her Math and Khmer reading. She is always progressing and putting more and more effort into her studies. She is a mature child, who takes responsibility for her younger siblings and helps where she can at home. She loves AP's swimming classes and recently swam her first lap independently. She greatly admires her mother and has a close bond with her. We look forward to seeing Sokheang's successes at school and AP in the next years.

## Introduction to AP's new enrollees

We are very happy to welcome six new children who were accepted into AP family after they successfully passed through the requisite three-month probationary period.

In October 2017, we offered seven children from the communities we serve to join AP's programs. Every child welcomed into Aziza's Place is required to pass through a three-month probationary period. During this period, the children are assessed on their behavior, how well they integrate with the other children already at AP, their willingness and their commitment to learning in our supplemental education classes and in the local public school, and the level of cooperation from their parents. Most importantly, we watch to see that the new children are happy and fit in well at Aziza's Place.

From day one, the children exhibited very positive attributes and integrated very well with other AP children. They quickly learned the do's and don'ts and were well behaved, all the while being happy and joyous. The transition for these new entrants was made easier because of their several siblings that were already at AP, which provided

Sadly, one out of the seven children who had settled-in easily had to leave AP because his parents decided to move back to their province. Given how seamlessly Rotha blended into the AP family, we decided to continue providing support, in the least for his educational expenses, through our ever-expanding Community Outreach efforts.

#### Expanding our programs... AP Broadening its reach

In addition to accepting six new children into AP in 2017, we embarked on new initiatives **introducing community-based access to education in the provinces** closest to Phnom Penh as well as to new communities within the city limits.

This initiative grew out of recognizing the growing need for educational support to communities outside of Phnom Penh, especially given the dearth of NGOs active in the more rural communities. AP funds school fees, uniforms and educational necessities in return for regular updates from their parents to effectively monitor progress on each child's monthly attendance rates and school results.

In 2017, we also started to provide this *educational support* package to children from our communities whose medical conditions and needs precluded them from participating in the AP programs and activities. We are planning to expand our medical services as part of a greater healthcare program.

Finally, since the start of this year, we **start opening our doors to partner NGOs**, offering them the opportunity to join our supplementary education classes and extracurricular activities. Today, five children from our partner organization MAGNA join our daily extracurricular classes at our center.

Our management team and our Board are very excited by these developments as we prepare to increase our reach even further in the future!

## Expanding our programs... Making a Splash

In July 2017, we expanded our Sports Program by organizing swimming classes, with the goal to teach our children at least one swimming style (breaststroke). We believe it is a critical skill to have in life.

None of our children could swim properly at the start of the program, but today, after 12 classes to our pilot group of 10 children, the secondary school children can swim independently, with the primary school children being almost there as well! Given the popularity of the program, we are hoping to be able to expand the program to more of our children.

Many of our staff have observed that these classes not only bring the children new technical skills, but also have a positive impact on their self-confidence and general happiness. Swimming class is something most of our students look forward to all week.
